THE RED HEAD JAWFISH!! AN EXCITING NEW MARINE FISH



Since there are little to no photos available on this wonderful new jawfish, we have taken a few albeit not of the best quality. Jawfish are not too fond of a camera in their face! There is also little to nothing written about this new fish so the information we are providing here is solely based on our observations of the fish at the store. We have now had these three Red Head Jawfish for nearly three weeks. The general body shape is that of other Opistognathus species (Blue Spotted Jawfish and others). We have also observed very similar activity of this jawfish compared to the Blue Spotted Jawfish. These are not nervous hiding jawfish! Instead they are bold during the day time hours steadily hovering above their "home" waiting for food.

Feeding: These fish appear to accept just about any frozen prepared foods we are offering from chopped seafoods to basic frozen foods like mysis shrimp, brine shrimp, formula type foods by Ocean Nutrition and San Francisco Bay. They are NOT picky eaters. We have also offered these guys small live ghost shrimp meaning that they likely would swallow very small similar shrimp yet not attack larger shrimp like Cleaner Shrimp, Fire Shrimp and Coral Banded Shrimp.



Care: Like other Opistognathus Jawfish, this species seems to be hardy. We have them a basic reef environment with live rock and pebbles. The pH is 8.1-8.4, no ammonia or nitrite (of course) and a carbonate hardness of 8-12 degrees. We have been keeping these at a water temperature of about 78-80 degrees and they are completely comfortable and healthy. This comical jawfish builds its own home just like similar species. It digs out a cave and then drags small stones and pebbles to the opening creating its own jawfish condo. These fish are extremely powerful jumpers when spooked just like other similar species. They do not appear fond of one another so we have housed them all separately.

Appearance: Our poor photographs do not do the fish justice though we did NOT photoshop our pics to make them more stunning than they are as so many online sites tend to do these days. These fish have a reddish colored head with a mottled pattern that follows the length of the body. Along the length of the body, this jawfish has a metallic green sheen that seems to be enhanced when the fish gets excited (during feeding or when we are working near their dig outs). Though the colors of this fish are not extraordinary we do find them to be quite beautiful and interesting.

This is a fish that will soon be in high demand we believe. With its hardiness, changing color patterns and comical habits, the Red Head Jawfish will be a welcomed addition to the peaceful marine aquarium that contains live rock, larger shrimp, live corals and a covered tank.

KOI, GOLDFISH & PLANTS ARE HERE!!!



NOTE: If you plan on adding new fish to your pond and you have not tested the pond water, PLEASE bring in a water sample!! We will test your pond water for free (with a \$5 purchase) to ensure the water parameters are safe for adding new fish. Remember that just because your fish are acting normally does not mean the water is safe for new fish. Established fish can adapt to poor water quality as it degrades over a long period. New fish cannot make that acclimation to adverse conditions so quickly and could be killed. All you need to bring is about a half cup of pond water.... Don't forget your water sample!

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN PURCHASING A NEW FISH FOR YOUR AQUARIUM.....



Anytime you add a new fish to your aquarium, you should ensure it is in good health before you make the purchase. Adding a diseased fish to your existing tank can be disastrous. By taking some simple steps while shopping for a new fish, you can reduce the risk of this happening to you.

First, when you walk into your local aquarium store, look at the overall appearance of the aquariums. Are there numerous dead fish in the aquariums? Dead fish left in selling tanks are a good indicator you are in the wrong store. It may be common to see a dead fish when a store has thousands of fish for sale, but overall the sight of dead fish should be rare! Healthy fish are not dying fish. If a single aquarium has numerous dead fish, is the aquarium labeled as being quarantined? Certainly aquarium stores have fish that may get sick but if those tanks that have sick fish are not quarantined, then this is not the place you should be buying fish! The selling tanks should be clean and well kept and dead fish should be a rare site.

Now that you have found a store with good husbandry, you can browse for a new fish or two. If you find a fish you like, stand slightly away from the aquarium and watch that fish and the other fish housed with your fish. Healthy fish should be actively swimming about the aquarium (of course some species are less active). Are the fish in the tank showing signs of problems (clamped fins, rubbing or scratching on the aquarium ornaments, eroded fins, white spots on fins or skin, open sores, surface gasping)? If you see any of these symptoms, then you should avoid purchasing fish from that aquarium. Fish that hover in the water listlessly are most likely on the verge of breaking out with a disease condition. Fish that scratch or rub on ornaments may be carrying parasites that are causing this abnormal behavior. Clamped fins, cloudy eyes or damaged fins are certain signs of trouble. Even though the fish you like in that aquarium appears fine and healthy, if other fish housed with it are showing any of the symptoms listed above, the fish you like can quickly develop the same problems when moved into your aquarium.

Now that you have found the fish to be in good health and the fish housed with your new choice appear healthy, have the aquarium store salesperson feed the fish. They should actively feed if in good health. Never purchase a fish that will not eat at the store! If it does not eat there, it will likely refuse to eat when you get it home. Remember that it will have to compete for food with your hungry boys at home. Some fish species may require special foods (like many eels, discus, many marine species, rare fish). Purchase the right food for the species you choose.

Finally ask about the care and habits of the fish you want to buy. Is it a peaceful fish or an aggressive species? Does it prefer soft water or hard water? What temperature range can this fish tolerate and remain healthy? Does this fish require hiding places? Is this fish best kept in groups or singly? Is this fish hard to maintain? These are all questions you should ask if you are purchasing a species you are unfamiliar with. Of course if your salesperson has no idea (and if the salesperson does not find the information for you, you may be in the wrong place), then you should do some research on the fish prior to

purchasing it. Once you have solid information on the species you want to buy, you will likely have a good new addition to your aquarium.

If you have a quarantine aquarium, all new fish should be placed there for a minimum of 7 days. If during that period the fish appears healthy, is eating well and show no signs of problems, it can be acclimated to your main aquarium. Quarantine tanks are a huge benefit. If your new fish does develop a problem, it can be treated prior to adding it to your tank. This will protect your healthy fish from developing the same issues. It is also less expensive to treat a small quarantine tank than a larger aquarium.

Take a little extra time when purchasing a new fish. Making a mistake with a new fish can be a costly mistake whether it is from a fish disease or an incompatible addition that grows up and starts killing off your other fish! Stick with a store that takes care of their livestock, maintains a clean store and quarantines fish that are not in good health.
